Tools for Schools (TfS), by a multiagency consortium led by the Connecticut Department of Public Health. Tools for Schools is a low-cost, preventive, team-oriented, "action kit" program to improve indoor environmental quality (IEQ) in schools. Evidence is increasing that IEQ affects not only student and staff health but also academic achievement. The Connecticut Department of Public Health conducted a survey that generated qualitative data demonstrating the success of their TfS program.
