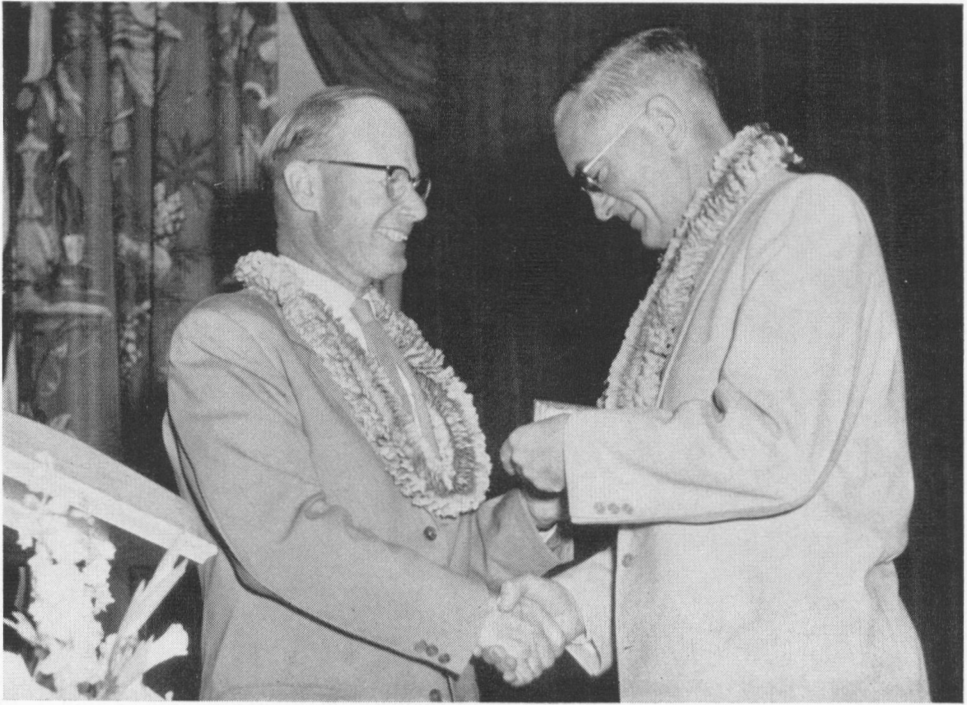

Highlights of New York Meeting

The 22nd Annual Educational Conference held in New York City the last week of July was a success. Your President is pleased to have the opportunity to report some of the highlights of the New York Meeting. For those who were unable to attend, I hope this serves as a means of learning what took place at the meeting.

The educational program, arranged by Chairman Jerome Trichter and his committee, was outstanding. On July 29 the meeting started with the invocation by Reverend Dan Potter, followed by the usual introduction of guests. Messages from Mayor Wagner and Governor Harriman were read by Chairman Trichter. Dr. Kandle, Deputy Commissioner of Health of New York City, pinch hitting for Dr. Leona Baumgartner, welcomed the Association to New York.

Many outstanding speakers gave interesting talks on subjects pertinent to the field of environmental health. We were privileged to hear such notable men as Dr. Arnold J. Lehman, Federal Food and Drug Administration; Dr. John H. Foulger,

Mixing pleasure with business was quite appropriate at the Thursday evening banquet. After an excellent dinner and the usual festivities, we were honored to hear an inspiring speech on "The Future in Sanitation" by Mark Hollis, Assistant Surgeon General, U. S. Public Health Service.

Also during the banquet, the Walter S. Mangold Outstanding Award was presented to Harlan Kingsbury, Registered Sanitarian from Newton, Mass., and President of the Massachusetts Association of Sanitarians.

Retiring President Hayes Evans was honored by Gerard Riley of Modern Sanitation and by William Hickey of the Health Officers News Digest for his outstanding leadership this past year. Your new president had the privilege of presenting the NAS Past President's tie clasp to Hayes for a job well done. Bill Essex, the co-chairman of the convention, ably served as Toastmaster for the banquet.

The Old Board of Directors Meeting on Monday, the General Assembly on Tuesday and on Thursday and the New Board Meeting on Friday gave all participants a good opportunity to help determine the operation of the association.
